There are a range of profiles on the committee but it is common for members to have signed up in their forties or fifties and still be members nearly 20 years later. We normally have about four committee meetings a year with sub committees where necessary.

EASTER EGG HUNT VOLUNTEERS

We had no volunteers in 2022 to run this event. We would like to resume in 2023. but need volunteer(s) to take this on. Should you feel this is something you could organise please contact Richard Maude or any member of the committee. Richard will provide advice to those who volunteer.

Some Facts about Eastcote House (outline of the house can be still seen in Eastcote House Gardens)

There were archaeological digs in 2012, 2014, 2015, 2016 and 2017. Amongst other things, the digs found foundations dating back to late 16th or early 17th century. There were also remains that date back to 15th century. Pottery found nearby dates the origins of Hopkyttes (the first known building on the site) to the around the 13th century.

The Stables building (renovated in 2014/5) is a Grade 2 listed building as is the Dovecot.

In 1881 Sir Samuel Morton Peto, Baronet and Justice of the peace, was in residence as a tenant. He managed construction firms that built many of the major buildings and monuments in London including The Lyceum, Nelson's Column and the current Houses of Parliament.

The property on the site was called Eastcote House from around the early 16th century with the building being demolished in 1964. For a good part of its life Eastcote House was owned by the Hawtrey Family including several called Ralph. One of these is pictured below.

AUTUMN PLANTING



We invite residents to volunteer to plant bulbs on any of the grassy islands of our estate.


Marg Bacon usually organises the bulbs so contact her or any member of the committee if you would like to volunteer. The committee will provide an appropriate number of bulbs.

The relevant islands are:

- 1. At the junction of St Lawrence Drive and Rodney Gardens around numbers 51 to 61.
- 2. In Rodney Gardens between numbers 47 to 47 and 66 to 68.
- 3. In Rodney Gardens between numbers 39 to 41 and 50 to 60.
- 4. At the junction of Rodney Gardens and Burwood Avenue by 9 Rodney and 47 Burwood.
- 5. In Burwood Avenue between numbers 40 to 42 and 27 to 37.
- 6. In Burwood Avenue between numbers 7 to 9 and 14 to 22.
- 7. The main entrance island at the junction of St Lawrence Drive and Bridle Road.
- 8. At the junction of St Lawrence and The Glen (The oak tree island).

The junction of Pamela Gardens and Field End Road is excluded due to fast moving adjacent traffic. Good luck and thanks to all who volunteer.

Do please volunteer to plant some bulbs. They do bring some joy to the estate in the spring.
